First Lesson

Genesis 9: 8-17

read by Dr Stephen Burrell, Durham University

The first lesson is written in the ninth chapter of the Book Genesis, beginning to read at the eighth verse.

Then God said to Noah and to his sons with him, 'As for me, I am establishing my covenant with you and your descendants after you, and with every living creature that is with you, the birds, the domestic animals, and every animal of the earth with you, as many as came out of the ark. I establish my covenant with you, that never again shall all flesh be cut off by the waters of a flood, and never again shall there be a flood to destroy the earth.' God said, 'This is the sign of the covenant that I make between me and you and every living creature that is with you, for all future generations: I have set my bow in the clouds, and it shall be a sign of the covenant between me and the earth. When I bring clouds over the earth and the bow is seen in the clouds, I will remember my covenant that is between me and you and every living creature of all flesh; and the waters shall never again become a flood to destroy all flesh. When the bow is in the clouds, I will see it and remember the everlasting covenant between God and every living creature of all flesh that is on the earth.' God said to Noah, 'This is the sign of the covenant that I have established between me and all flesh that is on the earth.'

Mark 4: 35-end

The second lesson is written in the fourth chapter of the Gospel according to St Mark, beginning to read at the thirty-fifth verse.

On that day, when evening had come, Jesus said to the disciples, 'Let us go across to the other side.' And leaving the crowd behind, they took him with them in the boat, just as he was. Other boats were with him. A great gale arose, and the waves beat into the boat, so that the boat was already being swamped. But he was in the stern, asleep on the cushion; and they woke him up and said to him, 'Teacher, do you not care that we are perishing?' He woke up and rebuked the wind, and said to the sea, 'Peace! Be still!' Then the wind ceased, and there was a dead calm. He said to them, 'Why are you afraid? Have you still no faith?' And they were filled with great awe and said to one another, 'Who then is this, that even the wind and the sea obey him?'

White Ribbon Sunday

The work of White Ribbon Sunday is to appeal to the Church of England to adopt an annual Sunday service, around 25 November, to remember the victims of domestic homicide and honour all victims of domestic abuse. The founder of White Ribbon Sunday, Viv Frost, believes that 'One Act of Remembrance, is One Step Closer, to One Less Name'.

Rosemary has written, 'It was a privilege to create something that reflected a little of White Ribbon's work. When life feels broken and there are areas of deep darkness, you can find signs of hope (orange) and the white ribbon is there. Behind all this is the cross of Christ in its completeness.'

Dr Stephen Burrell

Stephen completed his PhD at Durham in 2019, which investigated work with men and boys to prevent men's violence against women in England, including how young men make sense of violence prevention campaigns. Subsequently he carried out an Economic and Social Research Council Postdoctoral Fellowship on the role the business sector can play in preventing violence against women and promoting gender equality, and how to engage more men in such efforts. He has also undertaken research with Prof Nicole Westmarland and Sandy Ruxton for the Government Equalities Office about the impacts of masculine gender norms in the UK today.

Frank Mullane MBE

Frank set up Advocacy After Fatal Domestic Abuse (AAFDA) in 2008 following the murders of his sister Julia and nephew William in 2003. Frank helped ensure Domestic Homicide Reviews (DHRs) became law, and helped develop the Home Office DHR Guidance. He is a Home Office appointed reader of DHRs and a member of the national Victims' Panel chaired by the Justice Minister. He was on the assessment panel for the recruitment of the first ever (Designate) Domestic Abuse Commissioner and is a published author on the subject of domestic homicide. Frank is an Honorary Fellow of the University of Gloucestershire and was awarded the MBE in 2019.
